Why Aschaffenburg University of Applied Sciences?


Aschaffenburg University of Applied Sciences (Aschaffenburg UAS) is one of Germany's leading young universities. Since becoming a teaching institution in 1995, Aschaffenburg UAS has offered forward-looking programmes geared towards putting the latest research into practice. Today, more than 180 professors and lecturers teach approximately 3,400 students.

Top-ranked programmes

Due to its achievements in teaching and research as well as the international outlook of its programmes of study, Aschaffenburg UAS has been rated among Germany's leading institutions in various rankings.

Meaningful interdisciplinary collaboration

Due to its focused yet interconnected threefaculty organisational structure, students have easy access to opportunities for interdisciplinary collaboration. Business and law students have a chance to gain technology expertise, for instance, while engineers can brush up on their management skills.

Academic information and application

In general, German higher education institutions are classified as either universities or universities of applied sciences. As a university of applied sciences, Aschaffenburg UAS focuses more on gaining skills and knowledge which can be directly applied in professional life. Universities of applied sciences are more industry-oriented than their counterparts and professors must have practical work experience outside of the higher education sector. Both types of institutions can issue bachelor's and master's degrees.


Course offer



Credit system and grading

A full-time workload is 30 ECTS credits per semester. Grades are awarded from 1,0 (highest) to 5,0 (lowest) with 4,0 as the minimum passing grade. Some courses are evaluated on a pass / fail grading system.

Erasmus+ and exchange students will receive credits for all successfully completed courses and all obtained credits will be listed on a transcript of records. Students can download the transcript of records themselves, and it will also be sent directly to the home institution.

Academic calendar



Classes

Students are encouraged to organise their learning in a responsible and self-regulated way. Attendance is not compulsory for most classes. At the same time, active participation is expected. Please:

- do ask if you have questions,
- contribute whenever there is an opportunity,
- get in contact with your German classmates and do not be afraid of taking the initiative.

Often, so called *Tutorien* are offered – additional classes where students help you grasp the material. *Tutorien* are announced by your professors and on campus.

Fee

No fees will be charged by Aschaffenburg UAS, but all students have to pay the semester fee. In Germany, the *Studentenwerk* maintains a range of services such as the campus dining hall, the halls of residence, or counselling services. According to the Bavarian Higher Education Act, all students are to pay a small service fee for the administration of these services – currently 70 EUR (as of June 2023).

Nomination and application

Exchange students are nominated by their home university before they apply at Aschaffenburg UAS using an online application form.

Main campus in Aschaffenburg

Housing

The Studentenwerk runs two halls of residence on and near the campus, renting out furnished single rooms in shared apartments as well as furnished single apartments. For a small fee and upon request, the Studentenwerk also rents household packages that include bedding.

A room in the halls of residence is not guaranteed. This is why we recommend that you look for private accommodation as well. In Germany, many students live in flat shares (Wohngemeinschaft / WG). Each tenant has their own room but the kitchen and bathroom are shared. The cost of electricity, water, internet and telephone is also shared. Living and studying in Germany

The Federal Republic of Germany is located directly in the heart of Europe and extends from the Baltic Sea in the north to the Alps in the south. It is not big in size but offers one of the highest standards of living in the world as well as diverse art and culture, and it is well-known for its highquality products. With its 84 million inhabitants it has the largest population of all EU member states.



Germany is often seen as a byword for stability. It is a parliamentary democracy and its citizens trust in fair elections and the rule of law – it is a safe country where you can travel freely and feel secure. A German proverb claims that 'five minutes ahead of time is the German punctuality'. Germans are undoubtedly dependent and reliable. At the same time, German society is diverse, colourful and cosmopolitan. To most Germans, equality is an important value – living free from worry and with equal opportunities regardless of gender, race, sexual orientation, or religion.

The country is also considered an economic giant. Its machinery and electrical equipment are known for their high quality and durability and the country is one of the largest automobile producers in the world. While Germany can be proud of the richness of its economy, perhaps even more notable is its richness of human life – people have opportunities and choices. Germany has consistently been ranked among the best countries to live in by the Human Development Report.

Other campuses and facilities

While English-taught modules take place almost exclusively on the main campus in Aschaffenburg, there are also two smaller locations in town and a campus in Miltenberg, which is located about 40 km from Aschaffenburg.

Aschaffenburg UAS is a research-intensive university of applied sciences with special focus on intelligent systems, materials, information management and structural transformation. Within international research consortia as well as in intensive cooperation with local partners, our scientists strive to foster innovation in business and society. In the Centre for Scientific Services and Transfer (ZeWiS) Aschaffenburg UAS strengthens its cooperation with the regional industry. Located in Obernburg – halfway between our main campus in Aschaffenburg and our campus in Miltenberg – ZeWiS maintains more than 1,000 square meters of laboratory space for application-oriented research and transfer.

Practicalities

Arrival

Aschaffenburg is located around 40 km from Frankfurt, where a major international airport is located, making it easy to reach the area by plane. From "FRA Frankfurt Airport" you can take a train to "Aschaffenburg Hbf". There are also two smaller train stations in town: Aschaffenburg Süd and Aschaffenburg Hochschule, which is located next to Aschaffenburg UAS.

Visa

EU and EFTA nationals do not require a visa to enter Germany. If you are not an EU national, please contact the German Embassy or German Consulate in your country of residence to check visa regulations as well as residence permit regulations prior to travelling to Germany. Do not enter with a tourist visa.

Registration in town

All students have to register their place of residence within two weeks of their arrival at the town hall's Residents' Registration Office (*Einwohnermeldeamt*). After the registration you will receive a confirmation called *Meldebescheinigung* that is often required to open a German bank account.

Please bring:

- your passport / ID card,
- your certificate of enrolment,
- your rental contract and documents (Wohnungsgeberbescheinigung).

Insurance

It is mandatory as a student to have health insurance cover for your entire stay in Germany. EU and EFTA nationals are entitled to medical treatment with their European Health Insurance Card. Students from outside EU/EFTA countries should sign up for statutory or private health insurance. We recommend taking out a policy with a German statutory health insurance company. These institutions offer special prices for students — approx. 120 EUR / month for health and long-term care insurance.

In addition, we recommend taking out personal liability insurance (*Haftpflichtversicherung*). Although it is not compulsory, it covers unintentional damage to a third party or a third party's property.

Cost of living

Prices in Germany are in line with the EU average. The German government estimates the average expenditure for students to be approx. EUR 934 a month, which includes accommodation, food, study materials, leisure, and transport. There are many generous grant and scholarship schemes that can help to cover your cost of living during your stay.

Licence fee

Every household in Germany is required to pay a licence fee (*Rundfunkbeitrag*) of 18.36 EUR / month for public service broadcasting. The fee is subject to the principle of solidarity. It is relatively small because everyone pays regardless of actual media use.

Buddy programme

As an international student, you will be matched with a local "buddy" who will help you get settled in Aschaffenburg. Your buddy is a full-time student at Aschaffenburg UAS and will meet you upon arrival, show you around and help you with practical matters, such as registration or opening a bank account. During the semester, the buddies will organise social events and trips, and answer social questions throughout your stay.

Orientation weeks

Prior to the start of the semester, the International Office organises two (compulsory) orientation weeks. You will have the chance to learn some German, clear all administrative milestones, and participate in various events and activities. This is a great opportunity to settle in, meet new people and make some friends.

Preparing for your stay abroad

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Check the validity of your passport

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Fill in the online application form and wait for your letter of acceptance

Apply for a visa and/or check residence permit regulations (if you are a citizen of a non-EU / non-EFTA country)

Apply for the halls of residence or find other accommodation

Make a travel plan and book tickets – make sure that you can participate in the orientation weeks



Pay the semester fee



Have a medical and dental check-up

Make sure that you have valid insurance – for yourself, your property, and any damage you may cause to someone else or their property

Pack for your departure – remember to bring your travel documents and tickets,

passport / ID card, insurance papers, letter of acceptance, debit/credit card, and any prescriptive medicine.
